The Headwaters Rest Area near Three Forks on US Highway 287 opened Friday promptly at 9 a.m. Friday. A maintenance person reminded people who stopped by early that the facility would not open before 9:00 a.m. The facility was soon busy with cars and semis parked and people visiting the site.

The well-appointed rest area features reader boards explaining the history of the surrounding area. Three single bathrooms each serve the men's and women's areas. Each area has an American Disabilities Act (ADA) restroom. Picnic tables for visitors' use are protected from the wind and a designated animal area

According to a January 31 email from Lisa Olmsted, public involvement manager for the Montana Department of Transportation, the facility, the first of its kind in Montana, has a law enforcement office space for use by Broadwater County Sheriff's Department,

Montana Highway Patrol and Motor Carrier Services employees. The facility will better serve the southern end of Broadwater County.

Broadwater County Sheriff Nick Rauser said in an email he was waiting to hear from MDOT about the use of the office space. If a memorandum of understanding between the county and MDOT is in place, he plans to use the office for his deputy to conduct interviews and write reports. His office does not plan to man the office 24/7.

Bulldog Track Goes to Red Lodge Classic

This past Friday, the Broadwater Bulldogs traveled to Laurel for the Red Lodge Classic. A lot of the big schools were competing in either duals or triangulars, so many of the Class B and C teams were competing in one of a few big meets across the state including the Classic, as well as the Hamilton Invitational and Fergus Invite. Athletes from 27 Class B & C schools took to the Laurel complex a day early, as the meet was moved up due to a questionable forecast for Saturday. Being in Laurel gave the Bulldogs a preview of the venue that will be hosting not only their divisional meet, but also the Class A & B state competition.

The Varsity Lady Bulldogs placed second as a team with 82 points behind Huntley Project. The Lady Dogs have depth at many events with a strong squad and they added to that this weekend by returning a few from illness, injury and lack of practice time. The sprinters/ throwers almost universally improved their times/ throws and the distance squad placed a trio of runners in the top 10 at both the mile and two-mile distances.

Leading the way for the Bulldogs was senior Havyn Vandenacre winning the javelin throw and 100-meter hurdles, as well as scoring multiple points in her other events. Sophomore Kaitlyn Noyes won the triple jump for the second week, while also finishing in the top eight in all her events. Freshman Kyla Meissner pulled off the distance double by winning both the 1600-meter and 3200-meter races. Juniors Kaelyn Sangray and Abigail Wickens joined her in the top 10 at both distances. Holly Newman and Reese Wolfgram added a couple of top-ten performances in the long and triple jumps, while Jazlyn Martin and Aspen Slyker were both 7th in discus and javelin, respectively.

April 25, 2024 It will take approximately 45-60 minutes to complete

the developmental screener and will be held in the community room near the library.

Please note: Townsend School District is exploring HB352 which is an early literacy program, PreK program, designed to provide targeted interventions. The PreK program will be eligible to children who are 4 years of age or older on or before September 10, 2024, have not completed Kindergarten, and will not be proficient in reading by the completion of 3rd grade based on a development trajectory supported by a research-based assessment. If your student qualifies for kindergarten based on age but may not be ready, please register for kindergarten. Following Kindergarten Roundup, the district will be able to provide further information on the early literacy program, PreK, and if it will be available.

April is Military Child Appreciation Month





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Townsend School District Works

Toward Developing Vision and Goals

A small group of Townsend School District staff, administrators, and trustees met on April 4 for the second of three strategic planning sessions. This session focused on gaining agreement on draft purposes and values statements and using those to develop a first pass at a "big audacious goal".

"It is one of the foundational roles of school board trustees to maintain a long-term outlook for the school district," School Board Chairman Jason Noyes said of the strategic planning process. "It is important that we engage employees, trustees, and the community to strengthen our operations and ensure we are all working toward common goals."

The draft core purpose, a statement of the district's reason for being, describes that purpose as "developing each student's full potential, now and as future members of community and society, both locally and globally." The previous session also identified a half-dozen core values for the district in the areas of comprehensive education, stewardship, innovation, school environment, citizenship, and excellence in teaching.

Planning facilitator Andy Sever of the Montana School Boards Association (MTSBA), emphasized that the plan was still very much in the draft phase. However, Noyes said, the goals and values align with the direction of previous strategic planning efforts.

"This is good because it means we are still headed in the right direction," Noyes said. "When we get into the third and final meeting, we should start to see some more intricate, detailed goals and set some benchmarks to work on as the district operates on a daily basis."

Working in groups of three to five, attendees spent much of the meeting discussing elements of what that teaching and learning would look like in 10-15 years as they formulated what Sever described as their "big, audacious goal". Questions about what Townsend's school district could become the best in the world at, the nature of the school's student population, and ways the district and community could leverage each other to the greatest advantage centered the discussions.

With those thoughts top of mind, the group came to agreement on an initial goal statement: "Townsend Schools will provide innovative, transformative educational programming that is individually based in order to meet the academic and social/emotional needs of all students. Adaptable, high-quality instruction and educational opportunities will be utilized to meet student needs. The education will include off-site experiential learning, virtual learning, work-based learning and other learning opportunities."

With the big ideas captured, the yet-to-be-scheduled final session will focus on identifying trends and potential barriers to achieving that goal, then developing shortterm (1-2 year) goals and actionable, measurable steps to moving the district forward. Members of the public are welcome to participate in the upcoming session.

Community participation, which has been lacking in the first two sessions, is vital, Noyes said. "Unfortunately, what gets missed with limited participation is stakeholder buy-in. Strong community support is critical for our rural school district. Strategic Planning is all about reaching out beyond the walls of the school building to capture all aspects of stakeholder input. Those who want to employ our students after graduation. Those that want to see our students be successful as they take on challenges around our state, our country and our world."

Three Forks Area Ambulance (TFAA) Coordinator



March ended with 19 emergency responses.

Five transports to Bozeman Deaconess Hospital (BDH) were aided by American Medical Response (AMR) paramedics due to needed pain management. AMR

operates from Bozeman. Three Forks Area Ambulance (TFAA) emergency

medical technicians (EMT) did six more transports to BDH. TFAA did two standbys at fires to support the Three Forks Volunteer Fire Department.

The rest of the calls were for refusals of transport and unfortunately one death.

This past month the crew trained and reviewed the NARCAN protocols and crew members trained at Willow Creek Fire Department in conjunction with Gallatin County Sheriffs on the proper use of restraints.

The emergency medical responder class finished and TFAA gained 4 emergency responders (EMR). These folks will respond with an EMT and provide

This summer we hope to offer an emergency medical technician course and these new EMRs will have the opportunity to bridge to an EMT level.

April training this month will focus on triage training for major incidents. TFAA EMTs and EMRs will be training at the Amsterdam Fire Department. Three Forks Ambulance will present a mass casualty incident training later in the month at our station. TFAA has invited Three Forks Fire and Willow Creek Fire to participate.

One of our EMTs became a state instructor so now we have two state instructors. We hope to offer more community classes soon. We will keep you posted as we develop a class schedule.

We will try our best to keep the cost down for these classes and the QUALITY of TRAINING HIGH!

GIVE BIG, a Gallatin County event to raise money for nonprofits will be happening on Main Street in Three Forks on May 2, 2024. This event will benefit non-profit organizations in need of funds to continue their efforts in our community.

Please come out and support our efforts to provide emergency care to our Three Forks Community. Please look for more information concerning the GIVE BIG EVENT in town.

TFAA hopes more folks in our community will step up and become involved with our ambulance service.




I found something interesting about some special dates in April 2024 and thought I would share it.





So even though it is too early to turn on the sprinkler system, drag out that hose and water your trees, especially any young trees, to the drip line.

TREE BOARD NEEDS FENCE POSTS:

The Townsend Tree Board will be receiving its 2024 shipment of trees in April. For each tree planted they use 3 5-6.5-foot tall steel fence posts to stake the newly planted trees.

They will be receiving about 200 trees and will need up to 500 fence posts. New fenceposts are running about \$10 each. If any of you Broadwater County ranchers have used fence posts that you think you will not need in the future the Tree Board could sure use them and would consider some payment for purchasing the fence posts.

Final Decision Signed for Wood Duck Project in Big Belt Mountains



TOWNSEND, Mont. – April 5, 2024 – Today a final decision was signed for the Wood Duck Project located on the Townsend Ranger District of the Helena-Lewis and Clark National Forest.

"The Wood Duck Project utilizes active forest management treatments to manage widespread tree mortality," said Townsend District Ranger Aaron Webber. "This project will bring conditions closer to what is desired in the Forest Plan."

The Wood Duck Project area encompasses a total of 69,876 acres in the Big Belt Mountains, east of Townsend, Montana and north of U.S. Highway 12. The project takes place in both Meagher and Broadwater counties between the Confederate Gulch and Ray Creek areas. Proposed treatments encompass a total of 1,241 acres, including 936 acres of intermediate harvest, 42 acres of regeneration harvest, and 263 acres of pre-commercial thinning.


