# Fair all Wrapped Up!





City, County Agree to Code Enforcement in Townsend City Limits

Townsend's City Council approved an addendum to the terms of the city's agreement with the Broadwater County Sheriff's Office outlining which city codes deputies will enforce within city limits.

The addendum follows on a more general July 1, 2023, agreement between the parties for deputies to provide code enforcement in Townsend.

Under the terms of the agreement, deputies will enforce Townsend codes related to:

- Fire department provisions
- Sexually oriented businesses
- Noise
- Dogs deemed a nuisance
- Shooting within city limits
- Fireworks
- Water tower
- Curfew
- Social host
- Speed limits and
- Traffic on city streets.

The addendum went to the Broadwater County Commission for approval during their regular Aug. 13 meeting.

The August 7 Broadwater County Commission meeting opened with often-pointed criticism of the commission and county solid waste department's recent action. Under fire: the attempt to recover un-billed and under-billed solid waste assessments from previous tax years and the decision to close the remaining walk-in canister sites in the county.

"I do not believe we taxpayers should be responsible for someone else's mistakes," Tammy Rauser told commissioners during the open public comment portion of the meeting. "I, for one, did not intentionally fail to pay my solid waste fees. I have always paid my taxes."

Rauser said she feels the un-billed assessments should be dissolved. She also asked that the term "fee" should replace "assessment" for billings going forward.

"I am requesting an honest explanation," Rauser said, closing her statement.

Commissioners do not respond to public comments made on non-agenda items.

Bob Davis asked for clarification on when fees not previously assessed would be due. The county's letter to those with unbilled assessments indicated a due date of May 31, 2025. Payment arrangements are available by contacting the solid waste department.

Gayle Watson made several critiques of recent changes, noting the hours it had taken her to review her business financials to verify that the assessments she was being asked to pay were not previously billed.

The failure to bill assessments rose to the level of "financial incompetence," Watson told commissioners.

Watson then turned her statement toward the recent decision to remove walk-in cans at most of the county's solid waste sites and replace those with extended hours at Cedar Street and the transfer station. She asked the commission to consider those, particularly those living in Toston and Radersburg, for whom a 20-mile drive to drop off household waste at the Cedar Street site would be a hardship.

She also asked the commission why the "weigh to pay" system, where individuals pay a fee to dump non-household materials, such as construction waste and similar items, was not paying for itself.

Ultimately, Watson said, "Just like any other person, we're going to try to find a way to cut our costs." She indicated that her business and family had contracted with Tri-County Waste Disposal for solid waste removal.

County Public Works Director TJ Graveley commented during discussion of a different topic that the county still pays a "tipping fee" to Tri-County when the contractor disposes of waste from Broadwater County residents at a landfill.

Watson closed her comments by telling the commission, "Honestly, I think we should be innovative," indicating that she hoped the county would explore solutions to the solid waste issue rather than just replicating what had been done elsewhere.

Solid waste also appeared on the regular agenda, with county Assistant Public Works Director Misty Masolo presenting two resolutions: one to allow the department to assess and collect late fees for solid waste fees and a second to establish a canister rental policy for public use of the county's solid waste canisters.

Masolo said the county currently has more than \$38,000 in \$10 fees for non-household solid waste, with more than \$20,000 of that 90 days or older. The assessment of late fees was intended to compensate the county for the administrative costs of billing past-due fees as well as to improve the urgency for those being asked to pay.

Responding to a question from Commissioner Lindsay Richtmyer, Masolo told the commission that the department was close to being able to accept waste fee payments at the sites.

Both resolutions were tabled for the Aug. 13. meeting.



The Farmers Market is over half way through the season now. How appropriate that we set a new customer

record of 284 at the time of the summer Olympics competition where new world records are being set.

The Townsend Farmers Market is established to serve vendors from Broadwater County with the intention of encouraging growth in local endeavors that may be otherwise hindered with outside competition. The result is a benefit of buying local and building local. According to the 2021 study by the University of Montana Bureau of Business and Economic Research, for every \$17 of direct income at a farmers market there is an additional \$10 of indirect income to the community. (Montana Business Quarterly 2022)

The market continues to be successful and is growing.

New vendors have filled the gaps of those who no longer are able to participate.

What is at the Market this year? Again there are crafts, skincare, soaps, lotions, vegetables, meats, baked goods and food to be enjoyed while you browse over the displays of each vendor. # **One Foot in the Black**

Broadwater High School Junior Colt Barnard works hard to bring awareness to the Mann Gulch tragedy. On August 5, 1949, lightning hit a canyon in the Gates of the Mountains and started a wildfire. A team of fifteen smokejumpers parachuted into Mann Gulch to fight it. The fire expanded and trapped the smokejumpers on the ridge with no escape. Unfortunately, 13 of the firefighters lost their lives in one of the deadliest firefighting tragedies in U.S. history. The incident led to immediate changes in the way that firefighters now fight fires.

During the 75th anniversary of the fire, Colt worked hard to bring attention to this event. Coming from a long line of firefighters, this project has a personal significance for him. His mother, a firefighter herself, is now safer fighting fires. Not only does he have generations of firefighters before him, Colt also finds fire history interesting. "When I was little I would always research Montana history about fire. Mann Gulch always caught my attention. I just kept digging and found out the role it plays in firefighting and how little respect and knowledge people know about it. I made it my mission to bring awareness to it," he explained.

These words show Colt's dedication to this project. He made it his duty to commemorate those who passed in the fire. He took time to find more stable and permanent crosses to put up in the Gulch. Not only does Colt set up the crosses, he also runs a Facebook Page with his Mom, 'One Foot in the Black,' which aims to help raise recognition for the fire. He is working towards getting the area recognized as an historical area with the names of the fallen added to the National Fallen Firefighters Register. He has raised over \$5,000 and counting. His own family has pledged \$15,000 of their own money to help Colt with the project. The funds will go to making a better path for the trail, getting permanent crosses and commemorating the victims. Upgrading the area is only the beginning. The end goal is to help the memorial get recognized as a national monument and get more information to every high school and community library of the hometowns of the victims. Some of the jumpers were from North Carolina, Tennessee and New Jersey. Colt wants to educate their hometowns about Wildland Fire and the men's sacrifices.



AMR out of Bozeman can take up to 1 hour to get out to an emergency here in Three Forks.

# **Common Sense, Or Lack** Thereof

I remember being young(er), I remember doing stupid things. Yeah, I did, I know I seem like a calm, steady, quiet guy. YEAH RIGHT! However, I can NOT understand the lack of "Common Sense" I see from all these younger folks. I'm talking about the ones on the news, every night.

There are certain things you learn in life, don't stand under a tree in a thunderstorm, don't stand looking up with your mouth open under a flock of birds. ETC. One thing we have all seen is, folks from (Most) of the Middle East are full of hate. They have been spewing hatred and killing each other for CENTURIES. We should help the helpless, yes. BUT, many of the "radicalized" folks don't want our help except to help them exterminate an entire race of people. Then turn on us!

We are run by a Board of Directors and have an allvolunteer staff of EMTs, EMRs and Drivers. These folks are like all of you reading this article!

They have, however, stepped up to take a 120-hour EMT Course and continue training and CE hours to maintain their license to serve our community in the event of an emergency!

Our Drivers are all mandated to take a state-certified course in Traffic Incident Management, along with an inhouse instructor for ambulance protocols.

These folks leave family gatherings, and holidays, and get out of bed in the middle of the night to respond to emergencies. Our staff has regular jobs, homes and families to raise just like all of you.

We are fortunate to have several pre-med students out of Bozeman to serve our community. These folks live in Bozeman and come out and spend hours doing stand-by at our station. These EMTs need to respond with a senior EMT on the service.

Our Service Area consists of all WCFD Rural Service Area, the City of Three Forks and the TFFD Rural Fire District, which includes 1/2 of Logan, South Broadwater County, and down the Madison to Greycliff. Over 500 square miles!!

TFAA does not receive ANY PROPERTY TAX FUNDS. We are funded exclusively through grants, insurance billing (if we transport a patient to the hospital and they have insurance) and donations.

Last year (2023) we did a total of 304 emergency calls. Right now (August 6) we have reached 212 emergency calls.

Over the past years, we have had a revolving door of volunteers. This is NOT an unusual occurrence in Fire Departments or Ambulance Services across the country. Volunteerism is at an all-time low all over the country. Many folks join and move on once they get some experience with paid services or move toward medical school. We here at TFAA understand this and welcome these folks to serve our community while we have them!

Last month, in July, we had 53 emergency calls, and we responded to 90.5% of the calls. AMR had to back us up on 5 calls. We had 3 Senior EMTs down with their own medical issues. Even though we were short-staffed TFAA did an amazing job of responding to our community needs.

There are times when our staff cannot make a call. We

TFAA had to back up AMR in Belgrade one night last month due to their being short-staffed and could not meet all their emergency calls.

There are many new folks moving out here to the greater Three Forks Area. I have been asked why we do not have a hospital. My answer is "This has been historically a very rural community and now the growth is overwhelming, we do the best we can".

53 Calls for July 2024

17 - transports to Bozeman Deaconess Hospital ER.

4 - of these with a paramedic (for pain management) from AMR in Bozeman.

12 - refusals / These from mostly motor vehicle accidents and traumatic injuries.

3 - medical alarms/ welfare checks.

1 - structure fire to back up TFVFD.

4 - AMR out of Bozeman transported a patient to BDH when we had no available staff.

1 - AMR responded with no transport of a patient. A refusal 2 - responding to Country Jam with no transport to the hospital.

2- Hazard calls

7- canceled by FD or Law Enforcement prior to arrival at the scene.

1 - Dead on arrival (2 patients)

TFAA also supported Three Forks Rodeo during slack (Friday morning), and Friday and Saturday night Rodeos. We had all our staff available for the town, the rodeo contestants and several rodeo goers that needed medical attention.

Training for July consisted of Traffic Incident Manage ment Training and setting up a mock accident on Highway 2. This training will give our crew the experience of how dangerous it is to work an accident scene on the interstate with cars going by and not slowing down. We want everyone to go home safely at the end of the day.

TFAA just completed an EMT Course here at our station and we hope to gain 6 more active folks to our crew!! We are so proud of all the hard work and commitment they have made to become an EMT!

I hope this article helps people understand our Service better and Our Commitment to this community!

Hugh van Swearingen, a long-retired resident of Townsend, died peacefully at home August 9, 2024, following a lingering illness. He was 86.

Hugh was an independent man who got things done on his own and rarely asked for help. He was an outdoorsman and in his senior years he enjoyed carpentry and built his own house. Hugh had a 24-year career with The Associated Press. He retired at the age of 54 and sometimes said, "I won the rat race."

He was born January 1, 1938, in Butte to Hugh and Isabel (Kelley) van Swearingen, the second of their eight children. Throughout his boyhood years he was known as Butch. He and his brother David, younger by just 13 months and known as Mick, were inseparable pals.

Hugh was a graduate of Great Falls High and the University of Providence, Great Falls. He also studied at the University of Montana, Montana State University, Columbia University in New York City, and Portland Community College. He served eight years in the Army Reserve. He worked at the Anaconda Company smelter in Great Falls several times between college stints, and once in Los Angeles for a military contractor assembling components for artillery rockets.

newspaper. He and Mick also sold the Leader on downtown street corners at a nickel each. The papers cost them two and one-half cents each, so they made a profit of two and one-half cents on each sale. If they sold 100 papers each, and they usually did, they each pocketed \$2.50. Not bad for an after-school job for boys in those days. Economics at 2.5 cents a pop was a lesson in frugality that stayed with Hugh lifelong.

He got his first job as a news reporter in 1962 at the Lewistown Daily News. He joined the Montana Standard in Butte in 1964 and moved on to the Missoulian in Missoula as state editor in 1967.

In 1968 he began what was to become his career as a reporter, editor and manager with The Associated Press. His AP service included six years as newsman and later news editor in Helena, two years as correspondent and statehouse reporter in Bismarck, North Dakota, nine years as bureau chief in Helena and seven years as bureau chief in Portland, Oregon. He retired in 1992.

Hugh and Janet moved from Portland back to Montana in 1994, settling near Creston in the Flathead Valley and living there until 2000 when they sold their house, got rid of most of their belongings to live and travel in an RV trailer. They were avid hikers and backpackers, spending winters in Arizona and Utah and summers in Montana. A favorite hobby was hiking to remote ancient Indian ruins in Southwest desert country. They hiked extensively in Glacier National Park. In 2004 they bought a rural lot near Townsend and then spent several years building their own house.

After Janet died, he began seeing Nancy Marks and on her farm near Townsend soon learned that raising cows and growing hay was hard work. He said she kept him around because he was handy with a wrench and good at moving irrigation pipes. She sold the farm in late 2017, after which they made their home together at his house.

Hugh served eight years on the board of trustees of Broadwater Health Center, Townsend's local hospital and nursing home. He later served on the board of the Broadwater Hospital District. He was a member Hugh is survived by Nancy Marks, daughters Susan (Loren) Blossom, Helena, and Jenny van Swearingen (Bart Sevik), Missoula, and grandsons Taylor Blossom and Norris Blossom. Other survivors include sisters Mary Christine van Swearingen, Windsor, CA; Winnie (Juris) Ore, Helena; Vickie (Jerry) Edgar, Woolwich, Maine; and brother Carle, Livermore, CA. He was preceded in death by brothers Thomas (Donna) and Paul (Shelly), both of Great Falls, and David (Karen), Scappoose, OR.







# **Tasty Bits and Kitchen Tricks**

Eileen Clarke Rifles and Recipes

This is one of those 'favorite week-night recipes' that looks like more work than it is. The onion is in chunks and, while a head of garlic is a lot to skin and slice, it's easier to do with a mallet. More on that in a sec. Let's talk Parmesan. We like Parmesan in wedges, not pre-grated, but we don't grate it either. Instead, we stand the cheese up on a cutting board and take thin slices with a chef's knife. Faster, easier, and yet it looks fancy on a plate.

That mallet? It's a one-pound, rubber-headed, kitchenonly mallet I bought (\$8) for cutting watermelons down to size, but use more often for garlic. Set the whole head of garlic on a cutting board, lay a chef's knife flat on top of it (parallel to the cutting board), then give the side of the knife blade a moderate whack with the mallet. If the individual cloves don't separate from the root, give the head a harder whack. If they go flying all over the kitchen, use a softer touch next time.

Then gather the cloves in a single layer, lay the chef's knife across them—again on its side—and whack the cloves hard enough that they go flat and the skins burst. Repeat until all the cloves are squished flat, pick off the skins. Give the pile a couple of passes with the knife and you're done. Each clove cut into 4-5 pieces. Big chunks.



### **Zesty Italiano**

Serves 4-6

### Ingredients

- 1 pound linguini or your favorite pasta
- 3 tablespoons oil, in all
- 1 pound venison burger
- 1 yellow onion, chopped in big chunks
- 1 head garlic (half to sauté, half when the basil is added)
- 14.5 oz can diced tomato\*
- 1 tablespoon tomato paste
- 2 teaspoons BTB® beef base (reduced sodium)
- 1/4 cup chopped basil
- Parmesan cheese, slivered

\*If my tomatoes were ripe, I'd use about 2 cups of diced ripe Romas instead of the canned. But they're not.

### Cooking

1. Put a pot of water on the stove for the pasta, but don't start it yet. In a large skillet heat 1 tablespoon of the oil on medium-high and when hot, cook the burger in two batches, adding more oil for the second batch. Break it up in the pan and let it cook until just browned. Transfer to a bowl.

3. Add a tablespoon more oil to the pan and add all the onion with half the chopped garlic and sauté until the garlic slices are medium brown. Stir the meat back into the pan, then add the can of tomatoes, tomato paste and BTB beef base.

4. When the pan comes to a simmer again, reduce the heat to low and continue simmering, stirring the sauce now and then for about 10 minutes. As the sauce simmers, start the pasta, and cook according to package directions. In the last two or three minutes of simmering, stir the rest of the sliced garlic and all the basil into the pan. Let that cook until the pasta is done.

5. Drain the pasta, spoon the meaty tomato sauce on top, then some slivers of Parmesan with freshly ground black or even red pepper flakes on top. And to drink? An icy cold beer. Preferably a light pilsner rather than a stout!




