Town Pump Opens a New Store in East Helena

It is a new day in East Helena. Town Pump, Inc. has opened its new facility on the outskirts of East Helena at 3680 Highway 12.

The new store and Lucky Lil's

Casino hosted an open house on Thursday, Nov. 21. It will replace Town Pump's former facility on Wiley Drive. Employees at the former location will move to the new location, according to Director of Corporate Communications Bill McGladdery. Town Pump, Inc. has its corporate offices in Butte.

Town Pump opened its first gas station and convenience store in East Helena in 1968. Its store, at So. Lane Street and Hwy 287, will continue to operate. This new facility is the 106th Town Pump.

According to McGladdery the new facility, situated on 15 acres, includes a 22,500-square-foot convenience store with a casino which has a 3,500-square-foot spacious lounge and liquor store. The facility includes an outdoor patio and 20 television screens in its sports bar.

The convenience store features many new grocery items such as different kinds of milk, and staples such as ketchup, cereal and bread. Operations Manager Clancy Forward described the Beer Cave as a spacious 1,600 square foot room filled with local brews as well as the old standbys. He pointed out the upscale food preparation area with an open kitchen where food preparation employees may be seen making those special Town Pump sandwiches and corn dogs.

The facility plans to reach out to over-the-road truckers who need shower stalls and ice for their coolers. Two well-designed shower rooms welcome truckers. In the

back room are two huge ice-making machines. There are 24 gasoline pumps in front of the building, along with nine diesel dispensaries behind it. Next spring, RV dump service stations will be available.

Heritage Foods Grocery Manager Doug Carpenter welcomed the new business, saying, "It's Good for them and good for East Helena."

He did not anticipate a huge effect on his store saying the new convenience store may affect his lunch business for a while, but overall would be good for both businesses.

Editor's Note: Mt43News will be widening its coverage to include East Helena news in the coming months since many Broadwater County residents work in Helena and have children who attend school in the East Helena School District.

Montana Heritage Center to Open in 2025

Victor Sample Secretary of Visit Southwest Montana

Last week on November 21, 2024, Rachael Brug, Linda Huth, Nancy Marks and I were on a tour of the new Montana

Heritage Center in Helena, located at 225 N. Roberts. The Montana Heritage Center will replace the old Montana Historical Society Museum. Construction of the new Heritage Center began in the Fall of 2020 and will cost nearly \$100 million.

The new Heritage Center will also include the old (but remodeled) Montana History Museum. The new Center will add 66,000 square feet to the old History Museum. It includes a 15,000 square foot "Homeland Gallery", a larger Charley Russell Gallery, a 7,000 square foot Event Center and a state-of-the-art woodworking shop for creating the exhibits.

The exhibits are still not created and there is much construction yet to be completed, but the new Heritage Center is nearing completion. The Heritage Center is set to open to the public in 2025.



In addition to the actual Heritage Center building (and over 66,000 historical artifacts), the Center has funding to bring in school children from every corner of Montana. The Center will pay for the transportation, lodging and food to allow every school district to be able to have a "field trip" to the new Heritage Center.

The new Heritage Center will be a tremendous asset to Montana that every Montanan can be proud of – it truly will be a jewel of Montana.

Southwest Montana, our local regional tourism partner, scheduled the tour of the Montana Heritage

Montana firms during their Nov. 19 meeting. CK May Excavating of Belgrade and COP Construction, LLC of Billings were the low bidders for each schedule of the project, at \$3.029 million for infrastructure and \$8.232 million for the water tower installation, respectively.

Council Member Heather Healea recommended the council accept the recommendation of Robert Peccia and Associates in selecting CK May and COP

"In my professional opinion, I feel these bids are fair and accurate, and the budget is well accommodated," Healea said. "I don't see any major issues with scope gaps or anything that might blow the budget out of the water. Of course, there are always contingencies."

Total cost for the project, Mayor Vickie Rauser said, is approximately \$14 million, more than \$2 million less than estimated for the project. "This is really getting real now," Rauser said,


accepting the council's vote of approval. City Attorney Peter Simon confirmed for the council that the city either owns or has legal access

that he would not be renewing his contract to provide legal counsel to the city after the first of the new year.



Simon, who has represented the city since 2018, advised the Council that he would not be renewing his contract at the Nov. 5 regular meeting. He cited the difficulty balancing the work of his private practice with the ongoing

city projects among his reasons for stepping away from advising the City of Townsend.

In addition to drafting resolutions, advising the city on a wide range of legal issues, and researching and providing the city with recommendations on a variety of topics, the eventual city attorney may also be expected to represent the city in criminal and civil matters.

With the election of current County Attorney Cory Swanson as chief justice of the state's highest court and the departure of Deputy County Attorney Jenna Hatfield, the eventual Townsend City Attorney may also be asked to resume the role of prosecuting civil cases on behalf of the city.

The city will be accepting proposals from prospec tive attorneys through Dec. 20, 2024. Simon said he would be willing to extend his current contract for a few months should the search for his replacement extend past Jan. 1.

Candlelight Tours at Lewis & Clark Caverns

Candlelight tours are offered at Lewis & Clark Caverns State Park. Tickets can be purchased online or by phone starting Dec. 2

Lewis & Clark Caverns State Park will once again host candlelight tours of the entire developed cave route. This special event allows visitors to see and enjoy

the caverns by the warm, festive glow of candle lanterns—the same way the first explorers viewed them. Participants must make a reservation and purchase tickets prior to their tour. Tours will be offered from Dec. 20-22 and Dec. 27-29. The starting times of these tours will vary,

depending on park staffing for the day. Park staff will provide tour guides, candles, lanterns and hot drinks. The cost for this unique event is \$25 for visitors ages 15 and older and \$15 for visitors ages 5 to 14. All participants must be at least 5 years of age. Nonresident visitors must pay an \$8-per-vehicle entrance fee as they enter the park.

Tickets will be sold on a first-come, first-served basis and must be purchased online or by phone starting Dec. 2 at 8 a.m. Mountain Standard Time. To purchase tickets, click here or call 1-855-922-6768. No tickets will be sold at the park visitor center.

What to expect:

Candlelight tours follow the entire developed cave route, with a ¾-mile uphill walk on a potentially icy and snowy path to reach the cave entrance. Visitors must complete this within 30 minutes to be eligible for

the tour. Participants are encouraged to be prepared for winter conditions on roads and trails at the park.

Walking the ³/₄-mile underground trail involves

turning, bending, duck waddling and a slide. The first half will use the cave lights, and the second half will use the glow of candle lanterns. The tour provides an intimate look at cave formations, known as speleothems. Visitors will visit Decision Rock, the Cathedral Room, the Pit, the Garden of the Gods, the Brown Waterfall Room and the Paradise Room. The tour concludes with a flat, half-mile walk back to the visitor center on a potentially icy or snowy path. The total walking distance is 2 miles.

During the tour, visitors will pass near hibernating bats. White-nose syndrome, a fungus that affects bats but not people, has reached Montana. Bat mortalities from the disease have exceeded 80 percent in some areas. Managers are requiring precautions from visitors to reduce additional stressors to this fragile cave resource. Visitors cannot bring any clothing or other items that have been to another cave or mine in the past five years.

All tours are by a trained guide. No self-guided tours are available. The cave has an average temperature of 50 degrees Fahrenheit and over 90 percent humidity year-round, regardless of outside weather. Most areas are dimly lit, and some are narrow and enclosed. Visitors should consider bringing a warm jacket, good walking shoes and bottled water. Pets, strollers, backpacks and purses are not allowed.

Lewis & Clark Caverns State Park is about 15 miles southeast of Whitehall, along Montana Highway 2. For more information about the park, call 406-287-3541.

Significant Partnerships for Meaningful Impact In its inaugural year, MCF has partnered with two exceptional organizations: Native American Community Development Corporation Financial Services, Inc. (NACDC) and NeighborWorks Montana (NWMT). Each organization will receive \$1 million in loans to amplify their community impact, specifically to support affordable housing NACDC Financial Services, Inc. will use the

funding to expand its Home Loan Program, focusing on affordable housing for Indigenous communities across Montana. Angie Main, Executive Director of NACDC, shared, "We are very pleased to receive this investment from MCF. This partnership will change the lives and quality of life for those Native Americans who obtain financing through NACDC Financial Services. Together we create the opportunity for homeownership dreams to come true." The Federal Reserve reports Montana home-

ownership rates were 71% in 2023 and 68% in 2021. 2021 data from ProsperityNow.org, the homeownership rate in Montana stands at 70% for white owners, yet is only 51% for Native Americans. This disparity underscores the unique challenges Native communities face, particularly on reservations, where the inability to collateralize trust land

makes obtaining a mortgage nearly impossible. The challenges extend beyond reservations into urban areas. According to 2022 Home Mortgage Disclosure Act (HMDA) data, the mortgage denial

rate for Native Americans in Montana's urban

centers is 25.8%, more than double the rate for their White counterparts, which is 12.7%. These statistics reflect systemic barriers that limit access to stable housing for Native communities across the state.

NeighborWorks Montana will deploy their investment to advance diverse lending initiatives, such as down payment assistance for first-time homebuyers and real estate development financing. NWMT's goal is to grow its loan pool to \$65 million by 2027, impacting families and preserving affordable housing across urban and rural Montana. Their focus on innovative homeownership pathways ensures greater access to safe, affordable homes. "The Montana Community Foundation's investment gives us a lot of flexibility to meet a range of housing needs across the state," noted Kaia Peterson, Executive Director of NWMT. "Having MCF invest in this way is a real milestone for Montana impact investing, and we are so appreciative of their support in helping us provide

housing solutions for all Montanans." "Impact investing allows us to leverage capital in ways that create measurable and lasting benefits for Montana communities," said Mary Rutherford, President & CEO of the Montana Community Foundation. "We are excited to partner with organizations that are directly improving the quality of life for so many. This is just the beginning of our mission to bring meaningful change to Montanans."





A Memorial luncheon to celebrate Carolyn's life will be held in the near future in Illinois.





Vince and I had the pleasure of helping the Plymale Ranch round up cattle this fall. It afforded us the opportunity to ride with some new folks, see some new country and learn more about the area around Wall Mountain and the old Doig Ranch. Much to our surprise, the home was still standing and in relatively good condition. Per the Broadwater Bygones, the Doig Ranch was originally homesteaded by Tom Sherlock. David Doig, his For the love of Ag, from the heart of a western wife Mary and their three children came from woman, Scotland, settled briefly in Helena then bought the Sherlock place.

The homestead is nestled in a secluded, tranquil setting, with Sherlock Creek (often referred to as Spring Creek by some of the local ranchers) meandering by towards Sixteen Mile Creek. Wall Mountain (referred to as Walled Mountain in the Broadwater Bygones) serves as the stately backdrop to this special place, owned and well cared for by Plymale Ranch, one of the treasured generational ranches in the county.

Just like in the good old days, these family ranches work together, relying on kinfolk, friends and neighbors to get the work done. It is not unusual to see three and even four generations working side by side, living off the land and cherishing this lifestyle.

George Washington was quoted as saying, "Agriculture is the most healthful, most useful and most noble employment of man". Perhaps we should do all we can to preserve agriculture and the tales of days gone by, ya reckon?

Honoring Our Veterans – Monte Schnur

LaMonte (Monte) Schnur was

in Vietnam with the U.S. Army from November 1965 until April 1966. He spent his time there on water purification projects. He grew up in Wisconsin but came to Montana for a couple of years prior to being drafted, and was heavily involved with hunting, fishing, and trapping. When he entered

the military his occupation was listed as a fur trapper, which is kind of funny.

"This time of year I am especially reminded of Thanksgiving 1965, when I was 23 years old, in the Army in Vietnam. We were treated to a Bob Hope USO show, and it was really special! Anita Bryant was part of the show. It was a big difference from Thanksgiving in Townsend.

The U.S. was really ramping up its military presence, and our job was to get things ready for tens of thousands more troops. My Military Occupation Specialty (MOS) was "clerk" but I don't think I ever spent a day in an office.

Our Captain and Sergeant Major sent me out to replace the corporal in charge of the water point. Captain Montagne said, 'Rocky, South Vietnam needs pure water!' I was glad there were three or four operators assigned who really knew their stuff. We purified water with ERDlators, purifying equipment mounted on trucks. We mixed a flock of quicklime, charcoal, and hydrochloric acid, to purify water of parasites and germs, and remove bad taste.

At the first water point, we were guarded by five Vietnamese policemen with German shepherd guard dogs. We shared our rations with them and their dogs. One of the truckers told me one day that an artillery unit had moved in just down the road a ways. That night we had a pretty serious attack. One of the guards was killed.

Later in the day, some officers came with a Vietnam police officer, all dressed in white. He thanked me and thanked me for feeding his men and I don't know what all. I have never been thanked like that by anyone.

At our second water point, we had four ERDlators operating, taking water from a creek. This was a jungle, not far from the road. We had two ERD lators operating, and the 159th had two. Together, we pumped into 8 or 10 storage tanks. The 173rd Airborne detailed a company to guard us there. It was a dangerous place, with a lot of VC action. It was a wonderful break to get to see the Bob Hope show while we were at this water point.

I took a crew of 20 local people to our next site to clear the jungle with machetes for several days. They were good workers, and fun to work with. Bulldozers came in and enlarged the cleared area. We had gotten pretty well acquainted in a nearby village. A young lady there knew we were going to be leaving. She told me pretty forcefully, "You go!" At the end of that day, I took our two ERDlators to the compound. That night, a vicious attack destroyed the other two ERDlators at the site, and wiped out the 173rd guards. We heard that all of them were killed. In 2005, I guided a hunter who was talking about his dad being permanently injured while guarding a water point at Tan Hip in Vietnam. It turns out that four of the 173rd company had survived that attack.

The pressure was really on us to produce at the third water point. They were building a 400-bed hospital at Long Binh and getting more troops in all the time. We just couldn't keep up with only two ERDlators pump-

ing straight from the muddy creek, so I got a crew of

Vietnamese to help build a dam of sandbags. We put floating pumps out in the pond we created. We could provide clear water to trucks that needed it for things like washing floors and still had better capacity to purify water for drinking and medical use. Our production

went from about 1000 gallons per day to almost 5000. "When I was discharged and back home, I received this certificate of achievement and letter of commendation. It means a lot."

After his honorable discharge in 1966, he came back to Townsend and married Mary Ellen. They have 7 daughters and 13 grandchildren, 4 of whom are boys. Beginning in 1971 they operated Monte's Guiding & Mountain Outfitting for 45 years, leading very successful hunts.
