Every Thursday afternoon, a buzz of activity transforms the Townsend Wi-Fi Park into a vibrant hub of fresh produce starting with in-

season veggies moving into the summer veggies, fresh baked cookies, pork, frozen chicken, lamb and beef, eggs, laundry soap, local grown flowers, fresh bread, jam and jellies and a variety of very talented local crafters. The motto is "Grow It, Make It, Bake It." Townsend Farmers Market has become more than a place to shop- it's a celebration of community, sustainability, and the bounty of local agriculture and talented crafters.

From early spring, with the first market starting on May 22, 2025, from 3:00 to 6:00 pm to late fall, the market draws crowds with its colorful tents and the scent of fresh brisket smoking in the smokehouse. Local farmers proudly display their harvests, offering everything from asparagus, lettuce, spinach, peas, tomatoes, sweet corn, potatoes, onions and pumpkins finishing off the season.

It is about connecting people with where their food comes from. Customers get to talk to the growers, ask questions, and really know what they are buying. Artisans highlight their winter creations, including earrings, necklaces, blankets, tea towels and so much more.

There is always a friendly face and conversation is always welcome. Shopping local helps our community. Every dollar spent here goes back into our community. It is an economic boost, and it builds relationships between neighbors. Our Thursday market vendors are limited to Broadwater County residents only. You truly are helping your neighbors.

### Full Belli Deli Sandwich **Shop Reopens**

Jenny Chamberlain is selling sandwiches at Full Belli Deli like they were hotcakes.

New owners Jenny and Ed Chamberlain purchased the well-known shop in mid-March and, after extensive cleaning, painting and installing a new bathroom, reopened the Front Street shop on April 4.

She and the new employees were slammed – putting out sandwiches piled high with that trademark ham and swiss, pizza, meatball subs and whatever else was on the menu. "We planned a soft opening, not realizing such a huge crowd of people would come in that week to buy sandwiches. We sure didn't need a grand opening!" Jenny laughed.

Full Belli Deli, situated strategically on Highway 287 as it passes through town, began as a brand-new building constructed in 1993 by contractor Greg Norsby. He and his wife Heather ran it as a sandwich and pizza shop for two years before he sold it to Sandy Copeland. Sandy established the shop's reputation as a clean place where she served sandwiches made with quality meat and cheeses and plenty of it. She and her husband Les eventually added onto the building to house a sausage factory, according to Greg's dad, Jerry Norsby.

Ed pointed out the importance of quality ingredients.

"We will offer top-notch meats and cheeses and quite a variety of sausages. Eventually, we'll offer brisket and pulled pork. In the food business, you've got to give quality products or people won't come back," he said.

According to Jenny, they plan to add some salads to the menu as soon as summer arrives. "In winter, we'll offer homemade soups," she said.

Ed added that when they get their equipment up and

running properly and find enough help, they'll offer weekly specials and will expand their hours. As yet, the drive-up window is not open for service. They will accept phone orders, when they are not too busy to answer the phone.

Currently, the shop is open daily beginning at 11 a.m. They will be closed Easter Sunday, April 20.







### The Funny Thing About the Law

The world is full of funny laws. Take federal code 18 USC 336 for example. It's a federal crime to write a check for less than \$1.00. (I'm serious; it really is.) Why? The law was made in the days when the metal value of coins was greater than their dollar value. Before the law, people would horde the coins and write checks. Today, retailers would be happy to receive a \$0.79 check if it meant avoiding credit card charges.

And then there's Montana's MCA 7-4-4112 governing

filling a vacancy in a city council. Subsection 1 states, "Pending an election and qualification, the council shall, by a majority vote of the members, appoint a person within 30 days of the vacancy to hold the office until a successor is elected and qualified." It doesn't say we should wait for people to submit a letter of interest. Oh, no! It says we have thirty days to pick someone and show them the empty chair.

Gratefully, we're more reasonable than that (and no one from the state has said enything). The second Word

one from the state has said anything). The second Ward 1 council seat became vacant on January 1, 2025. It's been vacant for over three months — a good sixty days beyond the thirty days Montana state law gave the city to fill the seat. We really need that seat to be filled and we really don't want to just pick someone. Your city needs your voice, wisdom, experience, and passion. The position receives \$120.00 per month to cover

expenses and usually needs about ten hours of your time each month (sometimes more, sometimes less). There are two council meetings a month, occasional special meetings, and some committee meetings to help keep things moving. The appointment is through the remainder of 2025 unless you choose to run for election. We need someone from Ward 1, which is the east side of Cedar St. to the eastern edge of the city and the north side of Broadway to the north edge of the city. (An astute observer will point out that the County complex is actually in Ward 2, but my rebuttal is there are no permanent residents in the County complex. At least I hope there aren't. Of course, the map was drawn before the County complex existed, which makes you wonder who had a bee in their bonnet about it... But I digress...)

Please consider giving your city a bit of your time and submit your letter of interest for the vacant Ward 1 council seat today. We need your name, your street address, and a few words about yourself. Thank you!

(BTW, if you think what you just read was funny... if all six of us were to throw our arms in the air and walk out the County Commissioners would have five days to appoint just one council member who would then be responsible for appointing the other five. No letters of interest. No procedure. Just, "Bubba, here's your seat. Y'all meet next Tuesday." That's MCA 7-4-4112(2).)

Enclosed will be a check that reimburses you for the property tax overcharge. The amount is for the total overcharge of all your properties in Broadwater County. This total amount was calculated based on where your property is located and the corresponding school district. Your second half tax payment will remain the same as the first half. The Tree Board also received another small grant from Backyards of Broadwater County to plant trees this year.

completely since 2004. This includes tree inventories, tree pruning and removals, tree planting, and tree care, including spraying for insects and diseases for over 1,000 public trees.

City funding for the Tree Board has been sporadic over the years and the Tree Board has depended on sales of trees to private citizens, private tree planting services, private tree pruning and removal services, donations, and grants to raise enough money to fund tree purchases and other tree management expenses each year. The average age of most of the volunteers doing 85% of the work for the Tree Board is over 75 years. These volunteers have slowed down over the years, not being able to work the long days volunteering that they used to do. As a result, more days have been needed to raise the money needed to pay for trees and less work has been done maintaining existing trees. The support from the GCRF means that the aging volunteers can spend more time caring for (i.e., pruning, watering, and spraying for disease and insects) existing trees in the community forest.

The Upper Missouri River Reservoir Fisheries Management Plan guides fisheries management for Canyon Ferry, Hauser and Holter reservoirs and the Missouri River from Toston to Canyon Ferry and from Hauser Dam to upper Holter Reservoir. The plan sets fisheries goals and strategies to maintain quality multi-species fisheries throughout the system and was approved by the Fish and Wildlife Commission in December 2019.



Teacher Profile

I've wanted to be a teacher all my life, I can't imagine being anything else," says Mrs. Leona Plymale, who has been doing exactly that for 29 y ears. 26 of them in her home county of Broadwater. With the exception of 2 years at the beginning of her career, spent in Ronan, all of her teaching has been done in Townsend's elementary schools, and almost all of it in the 4th grade.

Presently, and not for the first time, she has 3 or 4 children in her class who are the sons and daughters of earlier class members.

Asked about differences in teaching and children in the years she has spent in the system, she says the changes come about so gradually that no great adjustment is necessary. She feels that today's young people receive a broader and wider range of information than their

counterparts of 30 years ago because the knowledge of the world and accessibility to it have greatly increased.

One thing that has not changed, she believes is the need for discipline to create a "learning situation" so that each youth is allowed to achieve his or her full potential. This can only be done when each student's rights are respected and this is the method used by Mrs. Plymale, who says the fourth grade is the beginning of growing up. Fourth graders are more independent, and it is, she feels, one of the hardest grades, but a turning point in their school career, when the gradual assent of the first three grades becomes much steeper.

For 29 years, she has been helping local youngsters to take this big step in their stride.
