# **Matt Nelson**

On November 2, 1919, 117 women pilots from around the country got together to form their own organization, and

they chose the name 'Ninety-nines' after the first 99 charter members showed up. Amelia Earhart was the first president, elected in 1931. Now it is called the International Organization of Women Pilots.

Four members of the Montana 99s came to the Broadwater County (formerly called Townsend) airport on Saturday, September 27th, to paint the airport name and the field elevation on the tarmac in front of the hangars and the location of the fuel pump, since the airport is now open to air traffic after the recent

reconstruction of the runway and taxiway, and tarmac.

The four ladies very diligently made extensive measurements of the letters and numbers to be painted and then applied an outline of each character with two-inch-wide blue tape. They were at the airport for about 4 hours.

Janine Schwahn is the Vice Chair, Amelia Earhart (AE) Scholarship Chair, and Airmarking Chair for the Montana 99s. She has held numerous officer positions in the past, and member since 2009. She said, "We go around to different airports and we put the name of the airport and the elevation. We paint it with 10-foot-high, yellow letters. We service 40 airports in Montana."

"It started back before the wars so that people could identify the airports, pre-GPS, etc, where you were,

and during the wars to cover up airfields. They all got covered over, blacked out, so now we do it again as kind of a historical remembrance for one of the things we used to do. So, it is a community service, and we do it for free. Montana Aeronautics gives us all the paint, and we use donations to buy all the supplies."

Jessica Lancello is an active board member on the Broadwater County Airport board. She said, "I am a Captain on the Boeing 737 for Delta Air Lines. My husband, Dylan Lancello, is a Captain on an Airbus 320/321 for Delta Air Lines. We have been in Townsend

for 6 years." Heidi Litton is the wife of Wade Litton, one of the two flight instructors at the airport.

Thanks to all of you ladies for painting the runway.

# Search for the Beginnings of the Centerville Cemetery

My search for the beginnings of the Centerville Cemetery reached a new low when I acted on what I thought was a brilliant idea. In my effort to figure out how the Centerville Cemetery came to be, I went to the Montana Historical Society website and accessed the public newspaper portal. I typed in 'Centerville Cemetery', hit search, and got 132 entries. Surely one of those would

have something about who started it.

I've made it through about 60 or so newspapers going back as far as the early 1900s and this is what I've learned. A quit claim deed from the city of Townsend to Broadwater County was done in 1945 and an association was formed by Mrs. Roy Noble, Mrs. Shirley Van Voast, and Barbara Doggett. Before that, 1938, a notice was put in the paper to have a meeting to create an association to take care of the cemetery. No other information on the results of the meeting or if one even took place.

# East Helena School Board Faces Public Concerns, **Approves New Shuttle Bus**

The East Helena School Board meeting last week drew a packed audience as

community members voiced concerns, administrators reported on a record enrollment, and trustees approved a new cross-town shuttle bus to ease traffic congestion.

The meeting opened with a tense public comment period. Residents Aaliyah Trembley Dryan and Anna Shipman addressed the board, urging action regarding longstanding allegations of teacher misconduct. Both speakers called for a transparent, independent investigation and expressed frustration over what they described as years of inaction. Board members, citing Montana's open meeting laws, listened but did not respond.

Enrollment is up across the district, with nearly 2,026 students now attending East Helena schools an increase of nearly 70 from last June. High school principal Paul Condon noted a surge in freshmen, while other administrators described crowded classrooms

and the need for creative scheduling. "We're feeling the pressure on space and resources," said elementary principal Gus Somerfeld, who reported some fourthgrade classes nearing state size limits.

Superintendent Dan Rispens reported that the district's central office relocation was completed under budget, with staff and the public responding positively to the new space. Security upgrades are planned but were delayed due to cost.

In new business, the board unanimously approved funding for an afternoon shuttle bus to help students travel between schools and reduce parent traffic. "We believe this will be a real convenience for families," said Rispens.

Other highlights included updates on summer maintenance projects, a robust summer school program, and the review and approval of several policy revisions to align with recent legislative changes.

The meeting concluded with the board approving Superintendent Rispens' request to attend a national conference in Nashville. The next regular meeting is scheduled for October 13 at East Valley Middle School.



# **Butte High Cross Country Invitational**

On Thursday, September 25th, a large group of spectators enjoyed the beautiful fall day at the Butte High XC Invitational. For the competitors, however, combining the words "warm and sunny" with an afternoon start makes for an uncomfortable run. However, the Broadwater Bulldogs were up to the task with five of them clocking their personal best times at 5K.

The Junior Varsity Girls were the first to the course at high noon; a two-loop path meandering around Highland View Golf Course on a gradual terrain where the runners stay within view for the entire 3.1-mile race. Logan Barkhurst (27:23) made her first start of the season for the Bulldogs, finishing 125th, while Fiona Nelson (37:09) came in 164th.

Next up were the Junior Varsity Boys with the largest field of the day of 269 runners. Luke Tullos (21:27) and Keaton Cavasos (21:30) lead the way for the team, finishing 132nd and 138th, respectively. Gavin Johnson (21:35 PR) and Urijah Duede (22:22 PR) both continue to improve, posting personal bests on their way to finishing 141st and 167th. These two gentlemen have shortened their times each week of the season so far, remarkable considering the varying courses and conditions. Rounding out the JV boys were brothers Trey (26:04) and Wyatt (31:51) Coker, finishing 244th and 265th. The JV squad placed 17th as a team with 524 points.

The Varsity Girls' gun blew at 1:10 with Kyla Meissner crossing the finish line 19 minutes and 27 seconds later, coming in fifth. Elaine MacDonald was not far behind in 44th place in 21:36. Freshman Addy Mosher continues to slash her times with her first varsity finish in 99th with her new PR of 24:37. The remainder of the team were: 105th Arabella McDaniel (25:24), 110th Shalyn Sentinella (26:01), and 117th Tana Santi (29:48). The ladies scored 344 points for a team finish of 14th.

Completing the day for the Bulldogs were the Varsity Boys with Junior Dallas Fligge continuing to improve in his return to cross-country, placing 67th with a personal best time of 18:10. Gavin Green (19:51) was next in 103rd. The trio of Rylan Hoveland (20:34), Clayton Rice (21:00), and Sam Flesch (21:07 PR) ran the whole race within sight of each other and finished 109th, 113th, and 114th. Making his first varsity start was freshman Isaiah Lapsley (23:44) in 121st. The team placed 16th with 490 points.

Homecoming week will have the Bulldogs competing at the Headwaters Invitational in Three Forks on Friday morning, October 3rd, at the Headwaters Golf Course. This will be the first real chance for our Bulldogs to measure how competitive they are against runners from their own division, while hopefully logging PR times on a historically fast course. Next on the calendar for the Bulldogs will be the Capital City 7 of 7 Meet at Bill Roberts Golf Course on October 9th, a full day of racing with nine separate contests and sixteen champions throughout the day.

are 3-0 in their season so far, with one conference win against Big Timber last week. The Wolves are 1-1 in the conference, coming off a loss to the Manhattan Tigers last week.

In the first quarter, the Bulldogs struggled to get on the board. The Wolves scored one touchdown, making the score 0-7 going into the second quarter.

Early in the second quarter, the Wolves scored another rushing touchdown, raising their lead to 14. The Bulldogs struggled to score offensively, but Tavyn Anderson had an interception on defense to stop one of the Wolves' possessions. Tavyn Anderson scored a 19-yard touchdown to finally get the Bulldogs on the board. Three Forks added a rushing touchdown and had a two-point conversion to make the score 7-35.

Freshman Heston Vandenacre played well, replacing Tavyn Anderson briefly for the Bulldogs. After Anderson came back in, the Bulldogs scored on a pass to Logan Johnson. The third quarter ended with the Wolves up 14-35.

The fourth quarter started with a Three Forks touchdown, extending their lead to 41-14. After that, Tavyn Anderson threw a touchdown pass to Bryce Lessley. The Bulldogs tried for a two-point conversion, but failed, making the score 41-20. Marek Easter had a sack on the Three Forks quarterback. Tanner Bird then blocked the Wolves' punt to down the Bulldogs on the one-yard line. Tavyn Anderson ran the ball in for a touchdown. The Bulldogs tried for another two-point conversion, but it was unsuccessful. The game finished with a Wolves win 41-26.

The Bulldogs will play Jefferson on Friday, October 3rd. The Bulldogs will play at home at 7 pm. It is the Bulldogs' homecoming game during which Homecoming Royalty will be crowned.







# **Townsend City Council Reviews Park Proposal, Fire** Agreement, and Rail Plans

The Townsend City Council met on Sep-

tember 17, with Mayor Vickie Rauser calling the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. Council members

present included Angie Wintrow, JB Howick, Vivian Boaz, Nate Brown, and Doug Sitton. During public comment, Jan Hubber proposed naming a city park after a local volunteer and requested to

be added to an October agenda for further discussion. The Council agreed to consider possible locations for this recognition. Sheri Heavrin, representing Townsend Schools,

requested a street closure for the Homecoming Parade on October 3 from 10:30 to 11:00 a.m., and permission for students to paint paw prints on streets near the school. Both requests were unanimously approved. Mayor Rauser updated the council on correspondence,

including leadership changes at MMIA and a letter from the Department of Transportation regarding the 2025 statewide improvement program. The council approved this year's tax levy at 68.42

mills, with 5.35 carry-forward mills available for next year. Mayor Rauser explained that the city did not need to levy for PERS and Comp Insurance Funds this year due to changes in requirements. A lengthy discussion was held on updating the Fire

Mutual Aid Agreement between the City and Rural Fire departments. City Fire Chief Shawn Simon and council members discussed equipment needs, cost-sharing, and the history of cooperation between the two departments. The council agreed to review existing agreements and draft a new one for legal review. Council member JB Howick provided an update

on the Big Sky Rail project, noting a potential timeline for passenger rail service between 2032 and 2034. He emphasized the benefits of rail for Townsend and encouraged the city to remain proactive in attracting a station.

Other business included pending ordinances, updates on city parks, and a reminder about the upcoming Trails Committee meeting. The next city council meeting is scheduled for October 7.

In other exciting news, I recently attended one of the day-long presentations at the Montana Historical Society conference about cemetery restoration. My brain is on fire! Since Broadwater County wasn't established until 1897, I may have to spend some time in the courthouses of Meagher and Jefferson counties. Oh darn. And the state museum in Helena will finally be opening in December. I wonder if they'll let me bring my sleeping bag and pillow.

I've also decided to postpone headstone repair until next year. For that, I will need help because those stones are very heavy and I'm old. I've talked to a couple people about helping me and know we can get this done. And I've talked to Adam Six about a possible mapping project with the kids from STOKE using whatever technology we can come up with to find where all the unmarked graves actually are. A group in Helena at the Forestvale Cemetery used cadaver dogs to map the Chinese part of the cemetery there. There are other ways, but we can let the kids come up with how to do that.

His obituary said he worked for the Shelley Ranch in Deep Creek, was originally from Missouri and died on January 28, 1922, from a brain blood clot and senility at the age of 75. What caught my eye was the way the newspaper

said he was an inmate of the county poor farm. An inmate? Sounds like the place was a prison. I wonder what those places were like. Any ideas? Senility at 75? I'm getting close to that age. Should I be worried? This is what happens when you take on a project

like this. It's really interesting but I find myself thinking about what the lives of these people were like, how they found their way here, why they left their home states, and a bunch of other ponderings I'll never have the answer for. # Rodeo Finally Gets Its Rightful Recognition by Being Designated as Montana's State Sport

Montana State Auditor James Brown of Dillon and State Representative Greg Overstreet of Stevensville

Later this week, cowboys and cowgirls from across the Treasure State will gather in Billings for the Montana Pro Rodeo Hall of Fame dinner. At that annual event, attendees will celebrate a bit of recent history - the 2025 Montana Legislature's designation of rodeo as Montana's official state sport. And rightfully so.

For generations, rodeo has been more than entertainment or the community event of the year. It has been a cultural tradition and way of life.

The sport developed from native traditions of horsemanship, animal stewardship, goal setting, and fair competition. From the famed Livingston Roundup to the Miles City Bucking Horse Sale to the Indian Relay

Races, rodeo showcases the Montana way of life and preserves family traditions and Western values.

Some critics may say designating rodeo as the state sport, alongside Montana's other treasures like the Grizzly Bear, the Western Meadowlark, and the Bitterroot flower, is mere symbolism. But symbols matter. By choosing rodeo, Montanans sent a loud message that rural voices, agricultural traditions, and small-town values still hold meaning in a rapidly changing world. It tells this generation of 4H kids that the work they put in at the barn, the pride they take in livestock, and the skills they learn on horseback aren't relics — they are relevant to Montana's ranching and farming communities.

In recent years, we have watched rodeo and livestock production come under attack elsewhere, such as Los Angeles and San Francisco, where rodeo has been banned. To protect Montana against such efforts, we brought forward this legislation. We were gratified to see it receive strong bipartisan support and overwhelming backing from citizens, rodeo associations, chambers of commerce, and agricultural organizations.

When Governor Gianforte signed this bill in April, he not only protected rodeo legally, he honored some of Montana's greatest athletes, including Bill Linderman, Dan Mortensen, Benny Reynolds, the riding Greenough girls, and many others whose grit and skill define the sport.

We are privileged to have helped give rodeo its rightful place in history — not just as a sport, but as a symbol of what makes Montana so special. We encourage Montanans to support youth rodeo, invest in arenas, and defend the sport against those who would prohibit it. Friday, October 3, 2025

who owned the empty lot at 100 Broadway across from The Commercial Bar and how it could be developed. Despite its small size, it seems that it would be a valuable development. We spoke about what could happen on the lot, who owned it, and what various kinds of development would mean for the city. Was I in favor of his ideas? Not particularly. Like

others who have looked at that lot he wanted to build a fast-food service, meaning the lot would be a small building and a lot of pavement and concrete adding congestion to an already congested intersection while distracting from existing services in the city and doing little to nothing to help beautify a city that, on approach from either direction on Highway 287, can only be described as "industrial." I told him I'd love to see some trees and a little green space. He wanted to paint a mural of trees on the side of the building.

So... what would I like to see there? Personally (and this is only my opinion), I'd like the city to buy the property and create some much-needed parking for the city — complete with some trees and green space. In fact, it would be nice to have some simple structures like a signpost that points to businesses and recreation or an interpretive display that describes the history of the city and the importance of the area. A nice place for people to stop and enjoy our fair town before continuing their journey. And some trees would be nice.

At the moment, everyone is kinda taking advantage of the generosity of the owner, Robert Peccia. Some of us have permission. My store uses it to unload flatbed trucks so we don't close streets. Rotary depends on the lot for parking during Fall Fest and uses it for their Christmas Forest during the Christmas season. But the vast majority of users don't have permission and are just parking: from people stopping for a quick coffee and donuts at Mountie Moose Bakery to people looking in at the amazing creations at Goose Bay Glass to folks relaxing at The Commercial Bar to residents attending a City Council meeting. The property is just

However, that won't always be so. Before the economic challenges of COVID-19, Mr. Peccia had sold the property to Valley Bank, which was considering opening a branch. That deal has fallen through. Robert Peccia recently sent a letter to the City explaining that he plans to develop the property — but he didn't say how. He likely doesn't really know how. The letter was certainly a polite reminder that he owns the lot and has rights, both of which are entirely true and correct. The City has known the Peccia family for a very long time and has always appreciated its relationship with them.

But what could be done with the property? Our store would be happy to find another way to unload pallets if that property is used to really benefit city residents and businesses. We're not so much in favor of losing that convenience for an absentee owner business (not that we have any choice in the matter, it's Mr. Peccia's property to sell or develop as he sees fit). So, what I wonder is if city residents think the City should work with Mr. Peccia to develop the property into something we really need. There are grants that can be applied for, foundations that can help and donations that could be sought from local residents and businesses, but in the end, it would require a commitment by taxpayers. And I respect the pain that would be, following the water rate hike.




Come join us for a weekend of good folks and good eats. Trust me, you will be glad you did! We need to make new memories for the cold winter months ahead.

# Herbs that Thrive Indoors

There is something satisfying about using fresh herbs in the middle of winter when the landscape is brown

from your own plants is even more gratifying. As our

Montana growing season is ending, consider starting a winter herb garden inside so you can enjoy fresh herbs year-round. Although it is slightly more challenging than growing them outdoors, many herbs can successfully be grown indoors. For the purpose of this article, herbs are defined as plant parts, often leaves, that are being used to flavor

or season food. In addition to being a food source, indoor herbs also provide fragrant foliage and visual interest. Like other houseplants, they can also absorb carbon dioxide, increase oxygen levels, increase positive feelings, reduce sound levels, and reduce stress levels. Some herbs grow great in containers while others struggle. Easy to grow herbs include parsley, mint, chives, basil, oregano, cilantro and thyme. Options that are a little harder to grow indoors are rosemary, sage,

lemon balm and marjoram. Avoid herbs with large root

systems like horseradish and fennel. If you have indoor

cats and dogs, then you may also want to avoid toxic plants such tarragon. Perennial herbs that were grown outside during the summer can be brought in for the winter such as rosemary, chives, thyme and mint. Some, such as mint and chives, benefit from a light frost before they are moved indoors, which will induce a rest period and stimulate growth. Annual or biennial herbs such as

started from seeds indoors. It's important to choose the right container with sufficient drainage holes in the bottom and well-drained potting soil. Clay or terracotta containers work great for herbs because they are porous, which allows the soil to dry more easily between waterings.

basil, parsley, cilantro and caraway can be successfully

Most home temperatures are perfect for herbs. Lighting is a much bigger issue. At a minimum, herbs need a window space that will allow them to receive at least six hours of direct sunlight each day. However, some species such as rosemary, thyme and bay laurel need 12 to 16 hours a day and it will be necessary to supplement light with a full-spectrum LED or fluorescent grow light. If plants are long and lanky, that is often a sign that they are not getting enough light.

Watering depends on the species, but in general, they would be watered when the soil is dry to the touch. Overwatering is the most common issue with houseplants, and can lead to increased disease issues, most commonly root rot. Generally, herbs don't need much fertilizer but could benefit from light fertilizer periodically throughout the winter.

Lack of humidity can be an issue in our arid environment but is generally not a major problem for herbs. If you use a wood stove, you may have more of an issue. If you feel humidity is an issue, then spraying or misting the leaves with a water bottle on a regular basis will help.

Harvest the same as you would outdoor herbs. Most herbs can handle periodic snipping and often have the best flavor right before flowering. Some leafy herbs like basil, chervil and parsley can even be cut back severely. For the mint family, including basil, cut on the stem right above a set of leaves. This will promote growth and result in a bushier plant. For perennial herbs such as chives, oregano and thyme, only remove one-third of the top growth if you plan to move them outdoors for the summer.

Perennial plants can be moved outdoors when the threat of frost has passed. You will need to slowly acclimate them back to the outdoors to more intense light and wind. Start by placing the pots in partial shade for a few hours a day. Gradually increase the duration outside and the amount of sunlight until they are fully accumulated. For annual plants, once they have flowered, they are usually coming to the end of their life. The flavor may change, often less favorable. I hope you enjoy your fresh winter herbs! For more





# **US Highway 287 and Silos Road Scene of Yet Another Accident**

The Silos turnoff east of Townsend on US Highway 287 was the scene of a second fatal vehicle crash in less than eight months.

According to Montana Highway Patrol Communications Supervisor Becka Howey, a 45-year-old Townsend woman died of her injuries Sunday, September 28, around 4:00 pm when her vehicle collided with a GMC Sierra pickup.

In an official statement, Broadwater County Sheriff Nick Rauser identified the Townsend woman as Jessica Andersen-Wear. She was driving a Jeep Grand Cherokee. She was not wearing a seat belt, according to the highway patrol report.

A 26-year-old woman and two men, ages 25 and 27, were occupants of the pickup. They were all wearing seatbelts. Their place of residence was listed as the Netherlands. All three sustained injuries and were transported to hospitals by Billings Clinic and St. Peter's Health ambulances.

The report indicated the pickup pulled out from the Silos turnoff to make a left-hand turn going south toward Townsend. The Jeep Cherokee was headed north toward Helena when the accident occurred.

On February 14 of this year, a Townsend man, Larry Zeadow, died in a fatal crash at the Silos and Highway 287 intersection.

# **Getting Ready for Fall**

Fall is an excellent time to tackle noxious weeds, as the cooler weather and increased moisture provide ideal condi-

tions. With a bit of planning, you can make a significant difference in managing these unwanted plants. Start by exploring mechanical methods—inspect your property for areas where weeds are emerging, especially around dead stalks, recently disturbed soil, and along edges. Now is the perfect time to dig up or pull rosettes, making sure to remove as much of the root as possible,

particularly for species like Musk Thistle and Houndstongue. You can also seed bare and disturbed ground or cover garden beds with a black tarp or thick mulch to smother weeds and stop seeds from sprouting.

Fall is also an excellent time to apply herbicides—ideally after the first light frost but before a heavy one. As plants prepare for winter, systemic herbicides can travel through the foliage into the roots, effectively controlling perennial and rhizomatous weeds. Spot spraying is now

effective since weeds are more noticeable. Products like 2,4-D and Dicamba can be beneficial for many species. For the best advice, please feel free to contact your local Noxious Weed District or Exten-

Don't forget to mark areas with noxious weeds or suspected noxious weeds, so you're ready for spring treatments. Planning will help ensure a successful and weed-free next year. Additionally, check the local herbicide training schedule from the MSU Extension and the Montana Department of Agriculture to stay up to date with your licenses.

CEO Justin Tiffany spoke to attendees and shared the top needs of our long-term facility. New quality mattresses were at the top of the list, as well as trained CNAs.


After discussion, it was unanimously voted to purchase a full-size mannequin to train CNAs, as well as purchase new mattresses with funds that are available.

# Saffron Restaurant - Butte

# Traveling Diners


We recently went to an event at the Motherload theater in Butte. We decided to spend the night in Butte rather than travel back to Townsend late at night.

In the past, when we stayed overnight in Butte, we stayed at the historic Finlen Hotel. It is in the Butte Historic District, and we always have a pleasant stay. But this time we decided to try another hotel in Butte's Historic District and found a "boutique hotel" right in the middle of the Historic District.

The Miner's Hotel is a restored building on West Park Street in uptown Butte. It is not a modern, new hotel, but it was a really charming, cozy room in the historic building. Parking is in an empty lot right next to the hotel, which was very convenient. We loved the room, but found uptown Butte can be pretty noisy on a Saturday night. That was really our only complaint about the hotel. The hotel is located about 2 blocks from the Motherload Theater, which is also located on West Park Street. That made it very convenient to walk to the theater.

We have dined at Casagranda's on Arizona Street several times. It is one of our favorite restaurants in Butte. However, we thought this time we would try a new restaurant, one we had not tried before. I had read several good reviews of the Rib and Chop House on Harrison Avenue – quite a ways from the Historic District and we made a reservation for dinner.

However, in just walking around the Butte Historic District, we found a restaurant we had never heard of: Saffron. Saffron is conveniently located on West Park

Street, about halfway between our hotel and the theater. It is a Middle East restaurant featuring kebabs, rack of lamb and, of course, good Montana Beef.

It looked interesting, so we cancelled our reservation at the Rib and Chop House and made a reservation at Saffron. It was a great decision. We thoroughly enjoyed the ambiance and the food at Saffron.

The restaurant is located below grade, so we walked down a flight of stairs from the sidewalk to the entrance of the restaurant. The entryway is very nicely done. On our way out, we noticed the stairs up to the sidewalk level had different ornamental faces on each step.

The restaurant itself is very beautiful, and our server was a delightful young lady who made the meal even more enjoyable. We ordered the beef kebab and rack of lamb. We also split the salad-du-jour. There were several appetizers that looked great, but it was just too much food for two people.

The kebab dinner was four very nicely spiced kebabs served with fresh vegetables and a flat bread. The rack



of lamb was a generous 7 ribs served with a salad of arugula, beets, pine nuts and feta cheese. The lamb had a small serving of whipped goat cheese on each rib.

The menu states that the table does not have salt and pepper because the chef knows how to season the food properly (but they are available on request). We did not need either. Everything was seasoned perfectly.

For dessert, we ordered a mango "mochi" (basically ice cream as a dough) and baklava—it is a Middle Eastern restaurant after all! The desserts were not quite as good as the rest of the meal. The mango ice cream was great, but the dough added nothing to the dessert. The baklava was okay; the nuts and honey filling were good, but the pastry was not light and flaky, but rather heavy.

We would heartily recommend eating at Saffron for both the ambiance and the excellent meal – but maybe have an appetizer and pass on dessert!
