Third Grade Students Receive Books

Fifty-eight third-grade Townsend Elementary students were presented the inspirational and encouragement book A for Attitude by the Broadwater County Lions Club. The book, written and illustrated by Australian author Julie Davey, has been translated into at least seven languages and is used by teachers, psychologists, children and parents in at least 14

countries.

The third-grade students display the books presented to each

of them by the Broadwater County Lions.

Written more than 20 years ago, the book encourages the development of positive attitudes. It contains sections on believing in yourself, overcoming fears, coping with bullies, dealing with anger and many other topics.

One lesson, called "boomerangs", states: "Your thoughts are boomerangs. In helping others, you help yourself. In hurting others, you hurt yourself. It may not happen today or tomorrow, but sooner or later, the thoughts you put out come back to you - good and not-so-good. Choose to be good to yourself!"

After receiving the book, the students participated • in the telephone game, one of the book's lessons. A statement is whispered into the ear of the first student in the row. That student then whispers what was heard

to the next student. This continues until the last student receives the message and reports what was heard. The message received by the last student usually differs greatly from the original message. The book's lesson on gossip says:

"Before you spread gossip about someone, stop and think how you would feel if someone was talking about you behind your back.

- Would you like your secrets spread around school?
- Is it even true?
- Could it make the other person sad? Would it make them lose friends?

Starting today, you can choose to be a loving, friendly person, or a nosy parker. (Nosy parker is an Australian term for an overly inquisitive person.)

It's up to you."

There are also lesson plans for the teachers to use. This is the seventh year the Broadwater County Lions have presented these books to the third-grade students.

Economic Summit

The second annual Big Sky, Big Future Economic Summit took place last week in Bozeman. Co-hosted by Governor Gianforte and the Montana Chamber of Commerce, the one-day



event was packed with renowned keynote speakers, nationwide business leaders, and state and federal lawmakers.

The Montana Chamber of Commerce led the day's discussions with an introduction summarizing Envision 2026, its long-range strategic plan that launched in 2016. According to the event program, Envision 2026 has four objectives or "pillars of a competitive and thriving economy" to "create opportunities for growth and prosperity" in the state. The first focus is the business climate, which includes lowering taxes, improving the legal environment, and "untangling" rules and regulations. The other objectives are entrepreneurship, workforce readiness through education and skills training, and upgrading Montana's aging infrastructure to promote economic growth and diversity across the state. As Envision 2026 ends this coming year, the Chamber is asking for input and feedback to help guide and identify business priorities in its next 10-year plan.

Several speakers and panels emphasized Montana's increasingly business-friendly climate and efficient permitting, which has helped attract businesses to the state, but the summit's recurring theme centered on the increasing worldwide demand for reliable energy.

Several industry leaders in attendance likened the global race for energy and technology dominance to the Cold War arms race. With an expected 20% growth in electricity demand in the next 10 years, an "all of the above" energy portfolio is essential for any company generating power. This means both renewable and





Photo tips:

Photo must be taken in Montana.

For a great action shot, have the fish halfway submerged, with the eyes above the water and the camera dropped

down to fish level. To include an angler in the shot, make sure the camera's focus is on the fish not the angler. You can do this with portrait settings on the camera. Make sure your shot is wide where you have the angler in the shot. You can always crop it for more close-ups.

To add better color to a dull shot, increase your saturation, drop those highlights and lift the shadows. The markings on the fish will show up better and provide more depth of field.

MSU to Host National Mathematics Contest for High School Students Nov 5 and 13

Montana high school students eager to excel at advanced mathematics are invited to register for free mathematics contests set for Wednesday, Nov. 5, and Thursday, Nov. 13, at Montana State University. Exams are administered in person on campus in Bozeman, and results are submitted online and measured against a national competition pool.

The American Mathematics Competition 10/12 contests, hosted by MSU's Science Math Resource Center in the College of Education, Health and Human Development, were developed by the Mathematical Association of America. The competition series provides an opportunity for high school students to develop improved analytical thinking, problem-solving and advanced mathematics skills.

The AMC 10 exam covers the high school mathematics curriculum through grade 10. AMC 12 covers high school math, including trigonometry, advanced algebra and advanced geometry, but excluding calculus. Both exams are 25 questions, multiple choice, and administered in 75 minutes.

The AMC 10 and 12 tests to be given on Nov. 5 (called Test A) and Nov. 13 (Test B) have the same scoring and rules of administration. Test A and Test B examinations are designed to be equal in difficulty and distribution of topics, but the questions are unique to each exam. Students may register for either contest or both.

Students through 10th grade and under 17 1/2 years old are eligible to participate in AMC 10; students through 12th grade and under 19 1/2 years old may participate in AMC 12. Students who score among the top national participants will be invited to take the American Invitational Mathematics Examination. Top scorers will also receive gift cards.

Competitions are challenging yet presented in a friendly and supportive environment. Organizers hope the contests will help students gain self-confidence, recognize their talents and foster a love for mathematics.

Registration is free for Montana students and is open until Oct. 29 for the Nov. 5 tests and until Nov. 5 for the Nov. 13 tests





traditional fuels will continue to play a major role in energy production, and suppliers will need to be diversified across all options. With the explosive growth of AI and data centers, power

reliability is the chief concern. Several of the speakers expressed that this demand must be met in a safe and sustainable way with a "no harm" principle. Data centers themselves were also discussed as a possible "anchor" to build needed transmission and gas infrastructure. Officials said Montana is at the intersection of multiple power markets, which provides opportunities to use external and regional markets to help consumers and increase the energy capacity in the state. As the AI race for dominance ensues, Mountain West

states like Montana are quickly becoming an ideal choice for data center locations. The cooler climate is ideal, requiring less cooling and water use. In some places data centers have become their own power suppliers, setting up a "microgrid," and foregoing traditional, front-of-themeter power sources. Ultimately, the message at the Summit was clear.

Data centers and AI are coming and the demand for reliable, baseload power and transmission is here, with little expectation of it decreasing. While demand may wane somewhat in years to come, the need for AI will continue to drive changes in business and in the workplace. The climate is a catalyst for entrepreneurship, business, and

After a successful two-point conversion from Bryce Lessley, the Bulldogs were up 21-0. The Bulldogs made another defensive stop, giv-

ing the Bulldogs the ball. The Bulldogs fumbled and

the Trojans recovered the ball. After that, the Bulldogs gained possession again and Bradan Martin scored a touchdown. After Logan Johnson's extra point, the Bulldogs ended the first quarter up 28-0.

In the second quarter, Bryce Lessley scored a touchdown, and Logan Johnson kicked an extra point, which gave the Bulldogs a 35-0 lead. Then the Bulldogs scored another touchdown, and Logan Johnson kicked another extra point. At the end of the first half, the Bulldogs were up 42-0.

In the second half, Bradan Martin had a long kick return to set up Tavyn Anderson, who ran the ball in for another touchdown. Once again, Logan Johnson kicked the extra point, and the Bulldogs are up 49-0. The Trojans scored a touchdown to end the third quarter with a score of 7-49, the Bulldogs up.

In the fourth quarter, the Trojans scored another touchdown and scored a two-point conversion. Later in the quarter, the Trojans fumbled with Bulldog recovery. Marek Easter ran the ball for a touchdown and Logan Johnson kicked an extra point to end the game with a 56-15 win.

Next Friday, October 24th, the Bulldogs will travel to Columbus to play the Cougars. This is the Bulldogs' last regular season game before heading into the playoffs.

BHS Cross Country Record Breakers

The highlight of last week's cross-country meet was watching junior Kyla Meissner cross the finish line in 18:18.95, which is not only her best time, but the fastest time ever run by a Broadwater Bulldog at 5K! Kyla has established a new school record and looks to challenge at the state meet in Missoula on Saturday, October 25th. She had held the third fastest time since her freshman year, behind two remarkable Bulldogs.

Most distance running records at BHS are held by Chiara Warner. She still holds the all-time Class B state

records in both the 1600 and 3200 on the track, was a two-time XC and multiple track state champion, and was the state of Montana's Female Athlete of the year in 2013, among many accolades. Most of her crosscountry career was run at the three-mile distance, with a few times logged at the 5K distance.

One of those such times was 18:41 logged at the Nike Cross Northwest Regionals in 2012. Chiara was a 2012 graduate of BHS, ran collegiately for MSU and Arizona State before graduating from the US Army's Ranger School.

The first year cross-country ran the 5K distance exclusively was 2017. The BHS 5K record of 18:38 was previously held by Emma Stolte, clocked at the Headwater Invitational in Three Forks during her senior season in 2021. She was an integral member of the 2019 and 2020 state championship teams along with Bailey Taves, Sarah Christensen, Justene Santi, Zoey Wickens, Emma Huffman, and Brooke Edgerton. Emma was also a member of teams that placed 2nd in 2021 and 3rd in 2018 at state. She finished 6th, 2nd, and 3rd as an individual runner before bringing home the state title during her senior year. She was also a three-time state champion on the track.

Emma is currently in her senior year running for the Portland State Vikings, and what a year she is having! She has been in the top 10 at all four meets of the season, with three of those being top 5. She won the 5K at the Ash Creek Festival on September 12th, which earned her the Big Sky Conference XC Athlete of the Week. Emma has clocked her personal best time at 5K (by shaving more than 42 seconds!) and 6K this season, which moves her up to fifth all-time at the 6K distance at Portland State.

The 2025 Big Sky Cross Country Championships will take place on November 1st in Bozeman at the Bridger Creek Golf Course. The men's 8K race starts at 9:00, with Emma and the rest of the ladies starting their 5K at 9:45. Wear your Bulldog blue or Viking green and come cheer Emma to another record time!

As several of you are aware, we live in Italy 10 months out of the year. We have been asked what a typical day looks like for us. This is our day:

We have a typical Italian breakfast of yogurt, a sweet

cake called a cornetto, and espresso or cappuccino. We are then ready to head out on our four-mile walk along the coast of the Adriatic Sea (the Italians call the walk area the lungomare). We see many other walkers ready to wish us a good morning. The walk is very peaceful with flowery bushes and the sound of the water. You will see wild rosemary

and lavender, along with many lovely flowers, as you stroll along. As we return to our apartment, we will stop for freshly baked bread as well as for fresh fruit and vegetables for the day. It's time for lunch, which is between 1 and 2 p.m. Most of the local shops are closed from 1 until 3 or 4 in the afternoon. They will remain open in the evening until 8 or 9 pm. In the afternoon, we have several places we can walk and enjoy the beauty of this area of Italy. We can walk to the Villa Communale (large city park), the Jewish

District to see the streets lined with flower-draped

balconies, the park in the center of town to visit with the local people or to the beautiful white-stone Cathedral. We can walk to the port to watch the fishermen unload their catch of a variety of fish. Once a week, we treat ourselves to dinner at one of our favorite restaurants. We might have a typical Puglian dinner of several vegetable dishes, a variety of meats, local wine, a dessert and espresso. At this restaurant, there is no menu; you are served whatever they have prepared for the day. We might also select a seafood restaurant or a fresh pasta place. Italians are

very particular about their food and expect the very

best. I should tell you that dinner is not served until 8

pm or later. Prior to going to dinner, the residents here

are out walking and visiting with their neighbors. They

call this their passeggiata. We do not have a car here, so walking is a big part of our day. We can always rent a car in a nearby town if we wish to travel around Italy. There is also a very efficient train system here. We have traveled by train to several towns in this area.

When I write again, I will tell you more about the town and its history. I hope you enjoy reading about this part of the world.

Rita Myles Carlson

It is with the utmost heartache that I inform her friends and extended family of the passing of Rita Carlson. She died September 21, 2025 of respiratory failure caused by a pneumonia she developed during recovery from knee replacement surgery.

Rita Devon (Myles) Carlson was born August 29, 1953, in Townsend, MT, to Robert Myles and Jean (Madison) Myles, joining an older sister (Fonda) and Richard (Rick) Rader and Gaylene Rader (from Jean's earlier marriage) and later being joined by another sister, Linda. She grew up in Townsend and graduated from high school there. She went on to pursue accounting at Northwest College in Powell, WY.

An early marriage brought her two children, Melissa McElravy and Neil McElravy. After divorcing, she raised her children as a single parent with no assistance from the father. Rita moved to the Lewiston (ID)-Clarkston (WA) valley in the mid-1970s, following her mother and siblings. A second marriage ended with her husband's accidental death.

Rita was a convert to the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. She was totally committed to Christ and to the church for the remainder of her life. She served many callings within the church, mostly involving children and young adults, and seldom missed an opportunity to attend a session at a Temple if one was nearby in her travels.

Her career path in Lewiston took her from waitressing to bartending to office manager at a local insurance agency, until she found employment with Potlatch Corp. (Clearwater Paper). She worked in several departments within the mill in both the paper and tissue sides. It was here that she met her future husband, Stephen (Steve) Carlson, and together they continued raising Melissa and Neil.

She was a strong advocate for the paper industry and was an early member of Comnet (a group of volunteers from all parts of the corporation). This group had the opportunity to visit schools, fairs, and other community events to promote the viability and renewability of forest products. She was also a member of Women in Timber and participated with the Clearwater Resource Coalition.

Her commitment and dedication to this effort led her to become a liaison for Potlatch to help educate and advocate the public on our renewable resources. In this role, she travelled extensively across the US, giving presentations and papermaking demonstrations to school-age children and discussions with civic organizations.

She firmly believed God gave us our resources to use wisely and not to waste. Also, to restore the land to the best of our ability after harvesting.

Rita's efforts in reaching out to share information led her to being invited to join the Alliance for America, a national advocacy and lobbying organization focused on conservative values, and she was immediately installed as their Vice-president of Natural Resources. During the Alliance's annual meeting in Washington, D.C., Rita spent many hours promoting the resource industries with various members of Congress. She was extremely honored for the support provided by Potlatch for allowing her these opportunities.

Rita received several accolades and awards during her tenure as Potlatch's liaison and VP for the Alliance. Her favorite was being awarded the Activist of the Year award from the American Pulpwood Association (a national industry organization). In the book "It Takes a Hero", written by William Perry Pendley (a Colorado Constitutional

attorney), a chapter is dedicated to detailing her involvement and accomplishments.

Also, during that time period, she was the subject of a feature article in the Lewiston (ID) Tribune discussing her role in the resource conversation.

During her life, Rita had multiple health issues. She was a three-time cancer survivor and had Sciatic nerve damage, but it was osteoarthritis in her back that forced her into early retirement. After her retirement, she and Steve built a house outside of Troy, Idaho and lived there until they bought a house in Deltona, FL. The climate in Florida was extremely beneficial for her arthritis as opposed to the cold in Idaho.

Rita loved to travel and also enjoyed crafts in her retirement, from card making to scrapbooking to genealogy. But her favorite pastime was sewing, primarily machine embroidery and quilting, which she shared extensively with family and friends. She was also a big-time NASCAR fan and attended many of the races at the Daytona Speedway, including the Daytona 500 multiple times. She was a Lifetime Member of the American Legion Auxiliary.

Preceding her in death were her parents, her brother Richard (Rick) Rader and two brothers-in-law, Robert (Bob) Curtis and Donald Olson. She is survived by her husband Stephen (Deltona, FL), daughter Melissa (McElravy) Cranfield (Titusville, FL), grandson Zach Smith (Vancouver, WA), son Neil McElravy (Deming, WA), granddaughter Avalon McElravy and twin grandsons Oliver and River McElravy (all in Bellingham, WA), sisters Fonda (Myles) Hibbard (Mirana, AZ) and Linda (Myles) Olson (Tucson, AZ), and sister Gaylene (Rader) Curtis (Townsend MT).

Rita will be remembered best for her service to others. Besides her commitment to the church and to her resource activities, she was also a part-time office volunteer for the Nez Perce County Fair (in years past), leadership in her local TOPS (a weight loss support) chapter and numerous other endeavors as her health allowed.

Above all, Rita Devon Carlson was a good person. She touched the lives of many people in her 72 years, and the world is a better place for having her in it. May she rest in peace.

Companies request approval from Montana Public Service

psc.mt.gov, Regulated Utilities/Electronic Filings/search Docket Number 2025.10.078) submitted today to the Montana Public Service Commission seeking regulatory approval for a merger between the two companies.

The merger will combine the strengths of both companies, resulting in an organization with greater scale, financial stability, and operational expertise. It is designed to create a stronger, more resilient energy company focused on delivering safe, reliable, and affordable energy solutions to customers. Under the terms of the merger agreement, Brian Bird, president and CEO of NorthWestern Energy, will serve as president and CEO of the combined electric and natural gas utility company, and Linn Evans, CEO of Black Hills Corp., will continue serving in his role through the close of the transaction, at which point he will retire.

The merger does not change energy service or rates for NorthWestern Energy's Montana customers. Regulatory oversight by the Montana Public Service Commission will remain unchanged.

"Bringing our companies together will deliver long-term value to our customers, employees and communities by providing safe, reliable and affordable energy solutions," Bird said. "By joining forces, we will have the added scale to make us a financially stronger, more resilient utility better equipped to meet the challenges of a rapidly changing

energy landscape." "We share a commitment to safety, reliability, integrity, us to improve life with energy for the people, businesses,

and communities we are privileged to serve." Key Benefits for Montana Customers:

- Continued Safe, Reliable, and Affordable Service: The combined company will maintain the high level of service customers expect, with no changes to local operations or regulatory oversight in Montana.
- Long-Term Rate Stability: Efficiencies from the merger are expected to moderate future rate increases, helping keep energy bills as low as possible.
- Enhanced Reliability and Resiliency: With a larger pool of crews and resources, the company will be better equipped to respond to emergencies and build and maintain critical infrastructure.
- Local Presence and Community Commitment: Montana operations will remain locally managed, with employees continuing to serve the communities where they work, live, and raise their families.
- Access to Innovation and Best Practices: The merger will enable the deployment of new technologies and the sharing of expertise, further improving service quality and operational efficiency.

In addition to the Montana Public Service Commission, the company will submit joint applications to the Nebraska Public Service Commission and the South Dakota Public Utilities Commission; the Securities and Exchange Commission; and the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission. The transaction will also require clearance under the Hart-Scott-Rodino Act and approval from each company's shareholders.

Instead of running the hills of Bill Roberts Golf Course, they ran the mile-long walking path around the park three times. The temperature was cooler, but there was no wind or rain, which made for lightningfast times for all.

What is normally a showdown between the Helena High Bengals and Helena Capital Bruins, the Crosstown Meet for the first time also included the Jefferson Panthers and our Bulldogs.

The gentlemen took the course first, with High's Milo Kauffman crossing the line first. First for the Bulldogs was Gavin Greene (17:20 PR) in 11th with
